The central topics of the module are:

The purpose of assessment:

Participants look at the reasons for assessing teenage students, as well as the types of assessment that exist, and the advantages and disadvantages of using different types.

Reliability and validity:

Participants look at the concepts of reliability and validity and see the importance they have in the assessment of teenage students.



Assessment as motivation:

Participants analyze how assessment can be used as a way to motivate teenagers, and different ways of preparing students for standardized assessment.

The use of assessment to create goals:

Participants examine how assessment can be used not only to measure students' progress but also as a way of encouraging students to develop their learning and set their own learning goals.

Creating and evaluating assessment systems:

Participants learn how to create assessment systems adapted to their own group of students as well as ways to evaluate the assessment systems they have created.

How will I study online?
